3.2 Crime and punishment in the USA

GUN CRIME

- ⇒ second Amendment: the right to bear arms → easy availability of weapons → high level of gun crime
- mass shootings, including at schools, are common
- the anti-gun control lobby, led by the NRA, is so powerful that it is almost impossible to introduce any form of gun control measures

DEATH PENALTY

- majority of states still have the death penalty but very few use it
- > lethal injection: most common method
- supporters: justice must be done for murder victims; death penalty is a deterrent; comfort for the victims' families
- opponents: all human life is of value; executing a killer does not bring the victim back; not a deterrent since many homicides are committed in rage or under the influence of drugs; Blacks and minorities are far more likely to be sentenced to death than whites



WAR ON DRUGS

- → very strict alcohol and drug regulations and penalties → ineffective in cutting drug and alcohol use
- → high legal drinking age does not prevent teenage alcohol use
- severe clamp-downs especially on marijuana possession and use overburdening of prison system with people guilty of minor drug offenses

WAR ON TERRORISM

- surge in patriotism following the 9/11 attacks = support for "war on terrorism"
- → founding of Homeland Security and US Patriot Act
 → detection and prevention of terrorist acts
- → US military action in Afghanistan and Iraq
 → eventual capture and execution of Osama bin
 Laden and Saddam Hussein
- criticism: reduction of civil liberties through Patriot Act; unjustified war in Iraq when no weapons of mass destruction were found
- controversy of Guantanamo Bay prison: alleged terrorists held without trial, possibly subjected to torture
